GRANTMAKING IN NEW YORK

AT A GLANCE

- Although the MacArthur Foundation's headquarters is in Chicago, many of the Foundation's domestic and international grantees are based in the New York metropolitan area, making it an important hub for grantmaking.
- Over the past 30 years, the Foundation has awarded more than 1461 grants to 367 organizations including the United Nations in New York State totaling \$460 million. Support was provided to advance grantmaking goals in the areas of human rights and international justice, peace and security, conservation and sustainable development, population, affordable housing, education, policy research, community development, and media.
- John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur had significant real estate holdings in New York City, including 19 residential office buildings and 6200 apartment units in Manhattan, and a large-scale mixed-use development in Queens. Over \$1 billion of the Foundation's \$6.8 billion endowment was generated by the sale of those assets.

The New York area has a important place in the Foundation's grantmaking, as it is home to many of MacArthur's domestic and international grantees. The Foundation has a particular interest in supporting international governance institutions, such as the United Nations, as a means of advancing human rights and improving global security. Since 1988, MacArthur has awarded 70 grants totaling \$17 million to the UN.

At the same time, the Foundation's New York grantmaking also has included support for affordable housing and community development. Through the *Window of Opportunity*, a \$150 million initiative to preserve affordable rental housing, the Foundation has invested \$7.5 million in the past five years to preserve and improve such housing in New York. That includes an investment of \$5 million in The New York Acquisition

Fund to help finance the preservation of more than 30,000 units, part of an overall commitment to construct or preserve 73,000 units in the City.
